BTP History: Notable Events

- One of the oldest forces in the country with origins in 1825
- Constituent Forces in the BTP 'Family' number over 230
- Roll of Honour- over a 100
 officers have been killed in the
 Line of Duty with at least five as
 a direct result of an act of
 violence
- The Centenary of the outbreak of the Great War. Hundreds of officers joined the colours with at least 135 killed in action. The Group laid many wreaths nationally and at the Menin Gate at Ypres.





Some BTP Milestones

- One of the first police forces in Britain to have women sworn in as police officers, in May 1917. The centenary was celebrated in 2017
- The Force Training School at Tadworth opened in 1948 and closed in 2010.

 Thousands of officers passed through it. The Group has unveiled a plaque on the site where it stood
- Technology First. By 1980 BTP was the first police force using computerised crime reporting
